Advocacy remained a priority for the Chamber, starting in January, when we joined with the Arlington Chamber for meetings with elected officials, followed by a reception. In March, as part of the Coalition of Tarrant County Chambers of Commerce, the Chamber hosted a breakfast for the Tarrant County legislative delegation, as well as a reception for all legislators and state officials. In September, the Chamber hosted a town hall meeting for State Comptroller Glen Hegar.

We also created **position statements** that addressed key issues concerning transportation, education, water and workforce development. During the legislative session, our **Government**





Affairs Committee followed several key bills potentially impacting businesses, working to ensure the bills reflected the priorities of our members.

The Community Alliances Committee supported nonprofit members by providing complimentary display tables at luncheons and email blasts. In addition, we supported three of 6 Stones Mission Network's initiatives: The HEB ISD Backpack Program, Night of Wonder and the Community Powered Revitalization (CPR).

Chamber Ambassadors made C.A.R.E. calls and personal visits to new and renewing members, encouraging their participation. Ambassadors also joined with board members and other volunteers to distribute membership directories during Member Appreciation Day.

The inaugural class of the **Young Entrepreneurs Academy** (YEA!) graduated in May. Working in collaboration with the HEB school district, YEA! teaches junior high and high school students entrepreneurial skills. Participants also presented their business ideas to a panel of investors.

The Chamber's annual **Relocation, Community Guide and Business Directory** was published digitally and in print. The Chamber also continued its partnership with the **HEB Economic Development Foundation**.

Chamber Lunch Mobs continued to meet regularly, helping support restaurants affected by construction work on Airport Freeway.

The annual **Stan's Chili Challenge was** held in October in the Chamber parking lot. The winning





recipe was from **Mason-Dallas, Inc.** And the **2015 Awards** were presented in January at the Texas Star Conference Centre in Euless. The list of winners is provided in the box at right.

For the Record

113 new members joined in 2015.

22 junior high and high school students participated in the inaugural class of the **Young Entrepreneurs Academy** (YEA!).

85 businesses exhibited at the annual **EXPO,** held in March at the Hurst Conference Center.

17 individuals graduated from the 2015 class of Leadership HEB, a ninemonth program. Leadership HEB alumni provided 5 scholarships for the class that started in 2015.

11 Membership Luncheons were held. Speakers included Leta Andrews, Steve Chapman, Mike Kelley, Steve Lineweaver and Jim Riddlesperger. In July, a joint luncheon was held with the Grapevine Chamber of Commerce.

100 members attended the five **New Member Orientation** sessions held during the year.

33 ribbon-cuttings were held, each one attended by some of our Chamber Ambassadors.

30 member volunteers made Challenge by Choice presentations on behalf of the Workforce Development Committee, encouraging students to take high-level courses. In total, the presenters spoke to 66 classes.

104 people attended the **State of the Cities Breakfast**. All three city managers made presentations.

116 golfers participated in the Chamber's annual **Golf Classic**.

11 Business After Hours events were held at member businesses. Two mixers were held with area chambers.

3 Leads Groups operated, and a fourth was started, enabling participants to meet weekly to exchange sales leads.
